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Introduction

This module focuses on the development of knowledge of critical cultures through research and analysis of texts and visual imagery.

The aims of this module are to:

- Introduce key concepts and ideas underpinning visual culture and contemporary art practice,
- Encourage students to examine ideas and theories related to cultural practices in the modern period,
- Relate theories and ideas in modern and contemporary visual art practice to their emergent practice,
- Become familiar with a range of cultural resources, gallery spaces and museums,
- Plan and structure written assignments in response to a brief,
- Contribute to discussion and seminar based presentations.

What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students will be able to:

- Critically analyse key concepts underpinning critical cultures,
- Appraise a number of theories informing visual and critical cultures in the modern/post-modern era,
- Identify key phases in modern and contemporary culture,
- Summarise different perspectives on the role of the museum and gallery as a site for presentation and display,
- Integrate theories within an emergent practice,
- Organise and present written assignments using appropriate academic conventions.
