

Annual Report 2019-20

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1. INTRODUCTION

Following the launch of its strategy, *Futures, Bold and Curious* in June 2019 NCAD began the 2019/2020 Academic Year focused on implementing the strategy through five defined strategic projects underpinned with detailed work plans. The Strategy sets out ambitious goals for NCAD to develop its learning and teaching and research culture, connect with the world beyond NCAD and continue to develop the systems and processes needed to ensure it is an effective organisation.

Sustainable growth in our part-time and full-time undergraduate students continued this year, enabled by further development of our Studio Plus year offered to all Design, Fine Art and Visual Culture students as an optional year through which students can experience real world learning and international exchange. There was a small decrease in postgraduate students due to the suspension of some courses as we go through a period of development of our postgraduate offer.

Considerable progress continued to be made in strengthening NCAD's financial position with an end of year surplus of €366,000 reported. Gerry McCoy was appointed as Registrar/Head of Corporate Services in October 2019 and during his first year of office he continued to implement NCAD's governance improvement plan with a particular focus on compliance within the Code of Governance 2016. Particular focus was given to procurement, risk management and review of IT infrastructure on campus.

As with all of society, NCAD faced unprecedented challenges in March 2020 with campus closing for the remainder of the academic year as a result of the pandemic. As a College of predominantly studio based learning, this required a total pivot to online learning for the NCAD community. A framework was put in place to enable a move to online assessment. The academic year was extended for our graduating students to support their transition to a digital completion of their final year projects. Studio based graduating students were invited back to the College in September 2020, post assessment, for Maker's Month during which time they were provided with access to the facilities to complete their final projects. NCAD online Graduate Showcase was launched by Minister Simon Harris during this period, followed by a number of online open studios and a series of graduate projects in NCAD Gallery through the winter of 2020. Despite the significant challenges they faced, our 2020 graduates demonstrated extraordinary resilience and focus in completing their time at NCAD in very changed circumstances to their expectations. The strength of the work achieved has been recognised in a number of prestigious national and international awards and we would like to congratulate all our 2020 Graduates for their significant achievements.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank both staff and students for their incredible commitment to the College in an extraordinarily difficult year. The impact of the pandemic and the Campus closure created significant challenges to all aspects of NCAD's operations and the staff responded quickly and effectively to find innovative solutions and to ensure that the students' learning experience was prioritised at all times. Despite our physical distance, the sense of community that defines NCAD was as strong as ever during this difficult time and this enabled NCAD to face the challenges with focus and a shared sense of purpose.

Finally, on behalf of NCAD I would like to acknowledge the continuing support from the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, and the Higher Education Authority, and to particularly acknowledge the additional support provided to enable NCAD to meet the challenges presented by the pandemic.

This ambitious strategy sets out NCAD's vision and strategic objectives until 2024. A detailed implementation plan was approved by An Bord in November 2019 with delivery of the strategy mapped into five strategic projects: Beyond NCAD, Building a Research Culture, Learning and Teaching, Working Together Better and Enabling Projects.

Financial overview

During the financial year 2019/2020, the college had a turnover of €18.974m (€18,962: 2019) and associated costs of €18,608 (€18,685: 2019) giving an increase in surplus to €366,000 (€277,000: 2019).

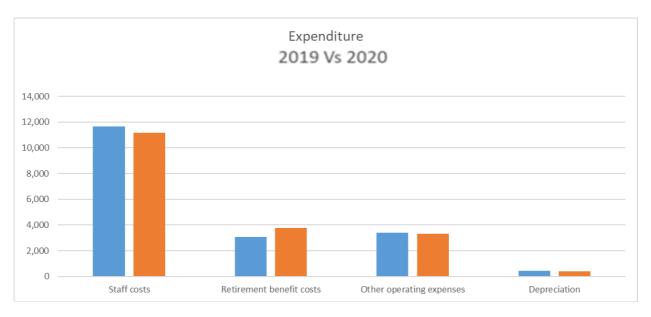
Sources of Income

Student fees accounted for €17.166m in income, of which €8.851m related to State grants and Academic fees accounted for €8.315m.

Expenditure

Expenditure for the year

In the year ending 2019/2020 there was a slight decrease in overall expenditure. The largest category of expenditure related to staff related costs (66%) and pension costs (16%). Operating expenses accounted for 18% of total expenditure.



Governance

An Bord of the National College of Art and Design was established under the National College of Art and Design Act, 1971. The functions of An Bord are set out in section 5 of this Act. An Bord is accountable to the Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science and is responsible for ensuring good governance and performs this task by setting strategic objectives and targets and taking strategic decisions on all key business issues.

A full description of Governance structures and activity is outlined on page 4 of the financial statements.

GDPR

A focus during the year was NCAD's compliance with GDPR, developing a roadmap for NCAD's compliance over the next period of time. We continue to monitor and ensure compliance with GDPR requirements.

Audit and Risk Committee

The Audit and Risk Committee met 8 times from October 2019 to September 2020. A description of Audit and Risk Activity is outlined on page 6 of the financial statements.

Annual Report under the Protected Disclosures Act 2014

There were no protected disclosures made to the College for the year ended 31st December 2020.

Health and Safety

An Bord received regular comprehensive reports and updates from the Facilities Manager on the progress of the health and safety compliance and management analyses.

A grant was received from the Higher Education Authority to assist with remediation work in the College. The initial programme of work included the replacement of all fire doors, the upgrade of emergency lighting and signage in the Granary Building. During 2020 the design team finalised plans around requirements and tendering. The tender process was finalised in the summer of 2020. The initial phase of the project was severely hampered by Covid restrictions.

During 2019 the College continued work on the development of a Health and Safety Management System assisted by SMT. Work is ongoing regarding the establishment of risk assessment for each department and appropriate training requirements to comply.

Campus Infrastructure

NCAD's campus infrastructure has suffered from lack of investment in recent years. Capital funding received from the Higher Education Authority will help address some work in particular fire detection and prevention systems. However, a focus for the year was the development of a campus remediation plan for the coming years with identified priorities and resources to address some of the critical issues while a longer-term campus development is considered.

COVID-19 Response

In March 2020 NCAD's Campus closed and NCAD moved to online learning by the following week. The Campus remained closed until September 2020, at which point we reopened the studios for our graduating students for a Maker's Month during which time they were provided with access to the facilities to complete their final projects. Following a full risk assessment of all activities, the 2020/21 academic year proceeded in October 2020 with a blended delivery for all studio based students.

3. NEW PROGRAMMES AND ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENTS

a. Programme Developments

PME Design, Technology & Engineering

In 2019 NCAD successfully applied for funding to support the development of a Professional Masters in Education in Design, Technology and Engineering. The programme was developed by the School of Education and the School of Design, in consultation with members of the Junior Cycle for Teachers (Technology) team.

The programme was approved by Academic Council in October 2019. In Spring 2020, upon review by the Teaching Council a request was made for the engineering content to be enhanced. Following consultation with colleagues in UCD, a revised submission was made to the Teaching Council in Summer 2020, with the process of securing Teaching Council accreditation ongoing.

Higher Diploma in Art

The Higher Diploma in Art, which allows part-time CEAD students to achieve 120 ECTS at Level 8 (the equivalent of two years full-time undergraduate study) was approved by Academic Council in February 2020. The Higher Diploma is a progression from the three CEAD University Certificates, approved in the previous year.

BA Design and BA Fine Art joint programmes with Visual Culture

Approval was secured for Joint Major programmes combining Design or Fine Art and Visual Culture, making use of the Studio+ year in Design or Fine Art to achieve sufficient credit in Critical Cultures for joint degrees. Undergraduate students in BA Design and BA Fine Art can undertake:

- a single major award (BA in Design or BA in Fine Art).
- to combine their major with a minor in Critical Cultures (BA in Design with Critical Cultures or BA in Fine Art with Critical Cultures).
- a joint major award combining Design or Fine Art and Visual Culture (BA in Design and Visual Culture or BA Fine Art and Visual Culture).

Exit Awards for all undergraduate programmes

As part of NCAD's commitment toward supporting students and recognising student success, exit awards were introduced for our BA (single major) awards in Design and Fine Art (offering a Higher Diploma in Design/Fine Art), and for the BA in Education and Design/Fine Art (BA in Education Studies with Design/Fine Art). The exit awards are available in exceptional circumstances only.

COVID-19 Response

From an academic perspective the COVID-19 measures implemented during 2019/20 included:

- An immediate move online using Google Classroom and Zoom as key platforms for programme delivery.
- An Academic Framework and detailed guidance on the use of Google Classroom and Zoom were put in place to support staff and students to work remotely.
- Introduction of a safety net for all students.
- An adjustment of deliverables in respect of many modules across our programmes.
- Extension of studio submission deadlines for all full-time final award students.
- Significant investment in a digital catalogue for final award students, and a programme of graduate exhibitions in the NCAD Gallery across 2020/21.

b. Policy Developments

Grade Descriptors

The NCAD Grade Descriptors were reviewed. The revised descriptors were approved by Academic Council in spring 2020, for implementation from September 2021.

Intellectual Property Policy

An updated version of NCAD's IP Policy that complies with Ireland's National Protocols in respect of IP was approved in May 2020.

4. PROJECTS AND ACTIVITIES

a. NCAD Online Graduate Programme 2020

The Graduate Programme 2020 took place from September 2020. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, our Programme took place online. Our digital catalogue, NCAD Works, showed the work of our 2020 graduating students; an extraordinary group who completed their NCAD journey during extraordinary times. This online and virtual programme promoted and documented the work of our graduate students through broadcasts from the NCAD's social media channels. It took the form of a series of curated online broadcasts that include: student-made behind-the-scenes filmed vignettes; online screenings of virtual and lens-based practices; film; and online symposia.

b. NCAD In Public

NCAD In Public hosted a number of exhibitions and events during the year including:

As part of the Change Lab 2019 project the NCAD Gallery presented American artist Mark Dion to speak on his practice on Thursday 28 March 2019. The **Change Lab 2019: What does it mean to create and shape art and design curriculum for the 21st century learner?**, 20 March - 16 April 2019, showcased concerns of Development Education as part of the NCAD teacher training in conjunction with the aims of the Ubuntu Network.

The NCAD Gallery presented **The Office for Common Sound (OCS)**, a nomadic project space managed by the artist Sven Anderson from 29 April - 12 May 2019 with two organised events: Office Politics - The Office for Common Sound - Sven Anderson and The City of Participation - The Office for Common Sound - Sven Anderson.

In the Age of Conscious Makers, 1 November 2019 - 6 January 2020, was a group exhibition featuring works of contemporary art and design aligned with research specimens on loan from the Trinity Geological Museum collection, Geology Department, TCD, curated by Anne Kelly, Curator, NCAD Gallery. Exhibiting practitioners included: Bassam Al-Sabah, Felicity Clear, Niamh Coyle, Elements of Action, Sonja Landweer, Isabel Loughran, Ruth E Lyons, Fergus Martin, Fiona McDonald, Jennifer Mehigan, Helen O'Connell, Nuala O'Donovan, Cóilín Ó Dubhghaill, Niamh O'Malley, Izzy O'Reilly, Michael Ray and Vivienne Roche.

The NCAD Gallery presented two performances of **Ack Ro'** from artist Jaki Irvine performing, with musicians Louise Phelan, Joe O'Farrell, Izumi Kimura, and Sarah Grimes on 9 January, 2020.

Underground Images: School of Visual Arts (SVA NYC): Subway Posters, 1947 to the Present exhibition, a selection of 60 posters created at SVA for display in the vast New York City subway system shown in NCAD Gallery from 13 – 31 January 2020.

Other People's Practices (OPP) Juncture Two artist in residence talks event with Glenn Loughran and Jonathan Cummins took place on 28 February 2020. OPP is an artist residency and research project supporting the production of collaborative, socially engaged projects in Usher's Island, Dublin 8.

The NCAD Gallery presented two selected OPEN CALL student projects, **PURGATORY** and **PANALOBBY** from Thursday, 5-11 March 2020.

Following the closure of the Gallery in March 2020, NCAD In Public moved to online activities for the rest of the year. These included;

A newly commissioned project, **Tongue The Sun, by artist Jonah King**. An online exhibition focusing on conversations on queer ecology including a reading from the essay, Unfathomable Intimacies by Jonah King, broadcast live on the NCAD Gallery YouTube channel on 17 July, 2020.

The NCAD In Public Digital Series event, **The Air We Breathe: Multiple Publics in Future Practice** broadcast live on the NCAD Gallery YouTube channel on 30 July 2020.

Kitchen Power: National Parallels online symposium, a two-day international online symposium which looked at the parallels and differences between mid-century modern kitchens in national contexts from Ireland to Spain, Scandinavia, Canada and Korea presented on 16 September and 17 September 2020.

c. The Edward Murphy Library and NIVAL

Key developments and Fundraising

Procurement and implementation of a new library management system was completed and awarded to OCLC for their WorldShare/WorldCat and Discovery system.

The Arts Council awarded strategic funding of €65,000 to NIVAL for the period January to December 2020. The Library received a small grant from the Art Library Society (ARLIS) 50th Anniversary fund for an event celebrating the production of zines.

Student Engagement

The library reported high levels of student engagement following a new process of induction for First Years, including an assignment through online submission.

Collection Management

Considerable work was carried out on site during 2019-20 – repositioning books, moving journals in the Edward Murphy Library and also in the library's three storage sites – the Portacabin, the New Store and the Annex. Improvements were carried out to the NIVAL premises, including the annexation of an adjacent room for collection storage. The Reading Room closed for the academic year to enable focus on safe storage and consolidation of special collections and archives. Exceptions were made for doctoral candidates and researchers with publishing or curatorial commitments.

Acquisitions / Deposits / Bequests

Significant collections were added to NIVAL through acquisition or deposit: The archive of the **Artists' Campaign to Repeal the Eighth Amendment**; **Richard Lewis**: press archive, photographs, drawings and fashion show footage bequeathed by the fashion designer; two more extensive collections of fashion-related documentation were received from designers **Liz Cleary** and **James Waldron**. Institutional records, drawings and cartoons from **Murphy Devitt Stained Glass**; the complete surviving archive of **Women Artists Action Group** (W.A.A.G.) from founder member Pauline Cummins; **Public Art Commissions** slide collection deposited by Jenny Haughton; **Monster Truck Gallery** complete institutional archive; the complete photographic archive of **Gerry Farrell**, photographer in residence at TBG&S from 1983 to 2018; **MExIndex** administrative files; the records of makers' organisation **Irish Feltmakers**. Angel Luis Fernandez made a significant deposit of documentary material from the **Library Project**, **PhotoIreland Festival** and **the Museum of Contemporary Photography (MoCPI)**. The complete library of the **Douglas Hyde Gallery**, compiled by John Hutchinson over 25+ years, was donated in full to the libraries at NCAD. Artist **Sean Hillen** deposited a large collection of assorted documentation: press, images, photographic material and posters from various projects. The complete archives of Dutch emigré designer **Cor Klaasen** were donated by his family. This extraordinary collection spans the artists lifetime and includes work in print, paint, drawing and graphic design.

Outreach / Exhibitions

NIVAL participated in the **PhotoIreland Festival** with a 6-panel archival display to the **Museum of Contemporary Photography of Ireland** at the Printworks, Dublin Castle.

NCAD contributed the digital archive of **The Change Lab**, an initiative for the School of Education, to the Arts and Culture in Education Research Repository (ACERR). The ambition of ACERR is to preserve and provide a global platform for digitised research outputs from the arts in education sector. The collections are hosted in the Digital Repository of Ireland.

The library hosted two public performance events with **Denis Keogh / Esther Raquel Minsky**: *To All the Shops I've Loved Before* – talks, readings and discussions, with vintage clothes sale, and *Time Travelling Trans Texts* – readings and discussion.

d. External Landscape

Design Educators Ireland

Prof Alex Milton is the inaugural chair of Design Educators Ireland, the representative body of third level institutions providing design education. Key activities include leading a number of the Government's Expert Group for Future Skills Needs Design Skills implementation projects.

The EyeVu Project

NCAD's Product Design department is part of a consortium which has secured €3.2m funding for the development of a new medical device. The funding has been awarded by the Department of Business, Enterprise and Innovation's Disruptive Technologies Innovation Fund (DTIF). The EyeVU project will deliver a disruptive, miniaturised 'eyeball' endoscope camera, which will allow clinicians to see around corners with unparalleled precision. The consortium is led by Galway-based MedTech start-up Tympany Medical, and includes NCAD, the UCD Centre for Micro/nano Manufacturing Technology (UCD-MNMT), and Shannon-based Gentian Services. As part of the project, NCAD's Product Design department will be involved in three work packages, which include contextual inquiry, human factors validation and sustainable design of the device for the circular economy.

Strategic Partnership with National Museum of Ireland

NCAD and the National Museum of Ireland (NMI) launched a new partnership, which will see the two institutions collaborate on a series of projects over the next three years. Under the partnership, NCAD and NMI will work together on research, contemporary collecting, academic funding applications, public talks, a research symposium and a major international conference.

Change Lab - Global Citizenship Education (funded by Ubuntu and Irish Aid)

School of Education staff members, Fiona King and Tony Murphy continue to develop their work with Professional Masters of Education Year 2 students on The Change Lab.

The Change Lab website was created (https://thechangelab.ie). The website functions as a digital repository and interactive educational resource to showcase the student 'Lab' experience and the multiple layers that the project involves. The Change Lab experience is reflective of the core principles that frame the CÉIM: Standards for Initial Teacher Education programme.

HEA – PATH Projects

The Programme for Access to Higher Education (PATH) programme commenced in 2017 and has run for three years. This programme is funded by the Department of Education and Skills and the HEA. NCAD is part of the Leinster 1 Pillar and is aligned with UCD, TCD, MIE and IADT for PATH 2 AND 3. For PATH 1, NCAD is partnered with UCD, TCD, MIE to develop a programme that will increase diversity within initial teacher education, entitled *I Can Teach*.

Student Shadowing Project

53 senior cycle pupils from 26 linked access schools participated in the Student Shadowing Project. This project aims to promote peer-mentoring opportunities for pupils who wish to explore their options in higher education art and design through spending time with NCAD students in studio and at lectures.

NCAD Clancy Quay Professional Enterprise Programme

This Professional Development Programme is an initiative of the NCAD Access Programme in partnership with Kennedy Wilson Ireland and with the generous support of the Ulster Bank Skills and Opportunities Fund. This programme took place throughout 2019 in both the Clancy Quay Artist Studio, Islandbridge, Dublin 8 and NCAD. A coordinator was appointed to the blended professional development programme for recent graduates of NCAD.

5. AWARDS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

NCAD Staff Prize 2019-2020

The NCAD Staff Prize for students was set up in 1994 and is funded by voluntary contributions from some of the NCAD staff. Students are nominated by their Schools / Departments for consideration for the award of the Prize in their final year, and from those nominated, a Selection Committee looks for one student who meets the criteria for the award. The 2019 Staff Prize, worth €1,500, was awarded to Product Design student Sabhín O'Sullivan and Visual Culture student, Tom Conlan.

The NUI Art and Design Prize 2020

The NUI Purchase Prize is awarded annually for a piece of work by a graduate of NCAD who has distinguished him or herself. Final year students are automatically eligible for consideration for the Prize. The recipient of the 2020 NUI Art and Design Prize was Linda McCann.

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Governance Statement and Board Members' Report

Governance

An Bord of the National College of Art and Design was established under the National College of Art and Design Act, 1971. The functions of An Bord are set out in section 5 of this Act. An Bord is accountable to the Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science and is responsible for ensuring good governance and performs this task by setting strategic objectives and targets and taking strategic decisions on all key business issues. The regular day-to-day management, control and direction of the National College of Art and Design are the responsibility of the Director and the senior management team. The Director and the senior management team must follow the strategic direction set by An Bord, and must ensure that all members of An Bord have a clear understanding of the key activities and decisions related to the entity, and of any significant risks likely to arise. The Director acts as a direct liaison between An Bord and management of the National College of Art and Design.

Responsibilities of An Bord

The work and responsibilities of An Bord are set out in its Terms of Reference which also contain the matters specifically reserved for decision of An Bord. Standing items considered by An Bord include:

- declaration of interests,
- reports from committees,
- financial reports/management accounts,

Section 15 (1) of the National College of Art and Design Act, 1971 requires An Bord to keep, in such form as may be approved by the Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, with consent of the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform, all proper and usual accounts of all money received and expended by it.

In preparing these financial statements, An Bord is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that it will continue in operation, and
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements.

An Bord is responsible for keeping adequate accounting records which disclose, with reasonable accuracy at any time, its financial position and enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with Section 15 (1) of the National College of Art and Design Act, 1971. The maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information on the College's website is the responsibility of An Bord.

An Bord is responsible for approving the annual plan and budget. The annual budget for the financial year 2019/20 was approved by An Bord 25 June 2019.

An Bord is also responsible for safeguarding its assets and hence for taking reasonable steps to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

An Bord considers that the financial statements of the National College of Art and Design give a true and fair view of the financial performance and the financial position of the College 30 September 2020.

An Bord Structure

An Bord consists of a Chairperson, five ordinary members all of whom are appointed by the Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, along with two academic staff representatives, two student representatives, the Director of the College and one non-academic staff observer. The members of An Bord were appointed for a period of three years and normally meet for a minimum of 10 sessions a year.

An Bord has established one committee, as follows:

1. Audit and Risk Committee (ARC): comprises three members of An Bord and one independent member. The role of the ARC is to support An Bord in relation to its responsibilities for issues of risk, control and governance and associated assurance. The ARC is independent from the financial management of the organisation. In particular, the Committee ensures that the internal control systems including audit activities are monitored actively and independently. The ARC reports to An Bord after each meeting, and formally in writing annually. The current members of the Audit and Risk Committee are: Frederick Goltz (Chairperson), Darragh Hogan, Sinéad Ryan and Séan Quigley. Members were appointed 27 June 2018. There were 8 meetings of the ARC in 2019/20.

Statement on Internal Control

Scope of Responsibility

On behalf of the National College of Art and Design we acknowledge An Bord's responsibility for ensuring that an effective system of internal control is maintained and operated. This responsibility takes account of the requirements of the Code of Practice for the Governance of State Bodies (2016).

Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a tolerable level rather than to eliminate it. The system can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance that assets are safeguarded, transactions authorised and properly recorded and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or detected in a timely way.

The system of internal control, which accords with guidance issued by the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform has been in place in the College for the year ended 30 September 2020 and up to the date of approval of the financial statements except for the internal control issues outlined below.

Capacity to Handle Risk

The College has an Audit and Risk Committee (ARC) comprising three Board members, one of whom is the Chair, and one external member, with financial and audit expertise. The ARC met eight times in 2019/20.

The College has outsourced its internal audit function which conducts a programme of work agreed with the ARC to ensure a comprehensive and effective internal audit work programme is carried out. In 2019/20, the ARC considered two internal audit reports. The remainder of the Committee's time was focused on the corrective actions and remediation to ensure the College was making progress with governance, risk register and internal controls.

Risk and Control Framework

The College has implemented a risk management system which identifies and reports key risks and the management actions being taken to address and, to the extent possible, to mitigate those risks.

The College redesigned its risk register in 2019/20. It was reviewed and managed by both the College Management Team and the Audit and Risk committee. The Chief Risk Officer is Head of Corporate Services. Risk is reviewed at every ARC meeting.

Risk and Control Framework Cont.

The risk register details the controls and actions needed to mitigate risks and responsibility for operation of controls assigned to specific staff. I confirm that a control environment containing the following elements is either in place or under development with a completion date set for 2021:

- procedures for all key business processes have been documented Completed
- financial responsibilities have been assigned at management level Completed
- there is an appropriate budgeting system with an annual budget which is kept under review by senior management - Completed
- there are systems aimed at ensuring the security of the information and communication technology systems In development
- there is a Resource Allocation Model within the College to ensure equitable utilisation of resources – In development
- there are systems in place to safeguard the assets In development

Covid-19

It would be very difficult to overestimate the impact that Covid-19 had on the operation of the College and the difficulties posed by Covid-19 had on the delivery of educational courses in Art & Design. In March 2020 all onsite classes ceased and NCAD had to pivot from an organisation in which 80% of delivery was workshop based to one where all 100% was delivered online. Following a review of potential risks, the following items were detailed and monitored in our risk register.

The initial challenges were

- a) Potential Financial impact of Covid-19 for the academic year 2019/20 and into the future
- b) Potential Impact on student numbers in 2019/20 and following years
- c) Lack of cloud based solutions for administration support
- d) No College VLE (Virtual Learning).
- e) Lack of physical IT infrastructure to allow for online delivery

To manage this Critical Response four subcommittees of the College Management Team were established.

- a) Teaching & Learning
- b) Information Technology
- c) Health & Safety
- d) Communication

The initial focus was to ensure online delivery of programmes and as the year developed the progression of students from one year to the next, with a particular emphasis on final year students.

During the summer of 2020 the focus changed to returning students for the academic year 2020/21. A large programme of physical works was initiated to ensure the safe return of students and staff.

Covid-19 Cont.

Large scale investments were made in risk assessments for each department, these were based on individual requirements bespoke to a particular area and practice. Physical changes of campus to ensure social distancing and to reflect the recommendations from the risk assessments.

Due to the requirements of social distancing additional teaching hours were required (circa 196k).

Additionally, the College secured the services of three specific purpose roles

- a) Covid-19 Manager
- b) Student Covid-19 Manager
- c) Staff Covid-19 liaison.

Funding was sourced (circa €1.12m (Oct 2020)) via the HEA (Higher Education Authority) which was vital in mitigating the financial risk posed by Covid-19 related costs. This proved timely and very welcome.

Financial Controls

Roles and responsibilities have remained the same throughout and there continues to be segregation of duties across all of the finance operations. A paper was presented to An Bord to allow for electronic signatures, electronic procurement procedures and electronic sign off, additionally a temporary derogation was given for an extended time for staff to submit expenses. Authorisation limits and payment thresholds were not changed. A note was sent to all staff outlining the agreed revised procedures operating during Covid-19 restrictions. The process around the posting and approval of journals has not changed as a result of the new working arrangements. Monthly management accounts and associated reconciliations continue to be performed in a timely manner. Strong controls remain in place regarding the changing of employee and supplier bank details on the finance system.

Budgeting and Forecasting

The potential financial impact of Covid-19 was identified as a key risk to the latter part of the financial year 2019/20. NCAD maintains a robust budgeting and forecasting process and during the latter half of the year revised budgets and forecasts have been produced on a monthly basis for internal and external bodies including the HEA and An Bord. Latest view budgets were presented to the Audit and Risk Committee and An Bord, this happened in March '20, June '20 and September '20. A particular focus was placed on cash flow and impact of additional Covid-19 costs on teaching and operational costs.

Risk Management

The 2019 Risk Register was updated in 2020 to reflect the risks associated with Covid-19. The Risk Register was presented to the Audit and Risk Committee and An Bord in March '20, June '20 and September '20 and risk is a standing item on both the ARC and An Bord agendas. Items that were identified were included in the SIC for 2019/20.

Information Technology

Thanks to the support of the HEA, significant investment was made in 2020 to upgrade the College Wi-Fi network with additional capacity provided on the physical network with the aim of increasing resilience on campus, which allowed for facilities for the additional requirements for online learning. A review took place during the later end of 2020 to review NCAD model of security on campus via the introduction of Active Directory and Microsoft Azure including cloud based backups. Additionally, a roadmap was created for the introduction of cloud based solutions for VLE, Finance and HR systems. Encrypted laptop and Mac computers were provided to the vast majority of staff. Staff who worked from home were offered and provided with the correct tools in line with HSA guidelines on remote working. Training and guidance has been offered to all staff via the appointment of Digital Champions to promote and help digital delivery and support in the use of IT.

Ongoing Monitoring and Review

Formal procedures have been established for monitoring control processes and control deficiencies are communicated to those responsible for taking corrective action and to management and An Bord, where relevant, in a timely way. I confirm that the following ongoing monitoring systems are in place:

- key risks and related controls have been identified and processes have been put in place to monitor the operation of those key controls and report any identified deficiencies.
- there are regular reviews by senior management of periodic and annual performance and financial reports which indicate performance against budgets/forecasts for the College as a whole.

The following monitoring systems are in development:

 devolved reporting arrangements are being established at all levels where responsibility for financial management is being delegated, and a system of reporting on same, being created.

Procurement

I confirm that the College has procedures in place to ensure compliance with current procurement rules and guidelines. Matters arising regarding controls over procurement are highlighted under internal control issues below.

Review of Effectiveness

The College's monitoring and review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control is informed by the work of the internal and external auditors, the Audit and Risk Committee which oversees their work, and the senior management within the College responsible for the development and maintenance of the internal financial control framework.

I confirm that the Board conducted an annual review of the effectiveness of the internal controls for 2019/20 including the impact on the control environment of the move to remote working referenced above. The Chair of the ARC has reported the findings of the internal audit review of the internal financial controls in place at year end 2019/20 to the Board during the 15 December 2020 meeting for An Bord. An internal audit tracker is updated each quarter and movements are presented to the ARC every six months.

Internal Control Issues

NCAD has completed a number of actions that aimed to address governance issues that were originally identified in 2014 as part of the audit of the 2011/2012 financial statements. During 2020, a number of weaknesses in control persisted as outlined below:

Fixed Assets

While a fixed asset register is in place, and the locations of assets are recorded on the register, assets are not tagged. It is expected that this final issue will be addressed during 2020/21. In addition, NCAD have identified a need to improve the communications by management of fixed asset disposals to the fixed asset register custodian. NCAD is currently recruiting a member of staff to manage the fixed asset register and fixed asset disposal recordings. Recruitment has been delayed due to the restrictions in place for Covid-19.

Procurement

Goods and services to the value of €207k were procured in circumstances where the procedure employed did not fully comply with government and EU rules. NCAD is continuing to progress actions to ensure full compliance with procurement rules a contracts databased for all contracts in excess of €25,000 was established in late 2019.

Additional to the €207k spend above, the following spend was outside the contracted period.

- 1. Security €75k Delays in obtaining TUPE information from the incumbent supplier resulted in delayed tendering
- 2. Cleaning €43k A new framework was due from the OGP, we were advised to wait for its implementation

Absence of formal procedures

All formal procedures were completed and are in place by financial year end 2020.

There are sectoral issues around implementing PMDS in the HEI sector. In the absence of PMDS, increments are awarded following managerial sign off.

Payroll and HR record keeping

Due to the onset of Covid-19 NCAD was closed to non-essential staff from March 2020. Remote working procedures and revised processes were established to ensure segregation of duties were maintained and appropriate oversight.

Significant improvements have occurred year on year following the establishment of a HR/Payroll function within NCAD. It is an ongoing process of continuous improvement. In 2019/20 there were minor weaknesses identified relating to the documentation process of starters/leavers. As a result additional mitigation has been implemented which will reduce the possibility of this potentially occurring again.

Opinion on the financial statements

I have audited the financial statements of the National College of Art and Design for the year ended 30 September 2020 as required under the provisions of the National College of Art and Design Act 1971. The financial statements comprise

- the statement of income and expenditure
- the statement of comprehensive income
- the statement of changes in reserves and capital account
- the statement of financial position
- the statement of cash flows and
- the related notes, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the assets, liabilities and financial position of the College at 30 September 2020 and of its income and expenditure for the year then ended in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard (FRS) 102 — The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland.

Emphasis of matter - deferred pension funding asset

Without qualifying my opinion on the financial statements, I draw attention to Note 15 which relates to retirement benefits accrued by current and former staff up to 30 September 2020.

The recognition of a deferred pension funding asset in respect of the Single Public Service Pension Scheme (€2.5 million) reflects statutory provisions relating to the funding of that scheme.

The recognition of an asset in respect of the Staff Superannuation Scheme (€89.3 million) anticipates that funding will be provided by the State to meet pension liabilities as they fall due. Inherent in this accounting treatment is an assumption that any income generated by the College will in the first instance be applied towards current expenses and that State funding will meet any shortfall in resources required to meet future pension liabilities.

Basis of opinion

I conducted my audit of the financial statements in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as promulgated by the International Organisation of Supreme Audit Institutions. My responsibilities under those standards are described in the appendix to this report. I am independent of the College and have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the standards.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Report on information other than the financial statements, and on other matters

The College has presented certain other information together with the financial statements. This comprises the governance statement and Board members' report and the statement on internal control.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements.

(a) General information and Statement of Compliance

The College was set up under the National College of Art and Design Act 1971 with its Head Office located on 100 Thomas Street, Dublin 8.

NCAD working vision: NCAD is the force driving critical practise and radical innovation through excellence in art and design. NCAD shapes the material world domestically and internationally through inclusivity, public discourse and cultural engagement.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with FRS102, the financial reporting standard applicable in the UK and Ireland issued by the Financial Reporting Council (FRC), as promulgated by Chartered Accountants Ireland.

The College is a public benefit entity and has therefore applied the relevant public benefit entity requirements of FRS102.

The accounts are prepared in Euro, which is the functional currency of the College. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest €1,000.

(b) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for certain assets and liabilities that are measured at fair values as explained in the accounting policies below. The financial statements are in the form approved by the Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science with the concurrence of the Minister for Finance under Section 15(1) of the National College of Art and Design Act, 1971.

(c) Going concern

The College incurred a series of operating deficits which has resulted in a cumulative deficit being carried forward for a number of years.

The financial statements of the College show a surplus for the year of €338,000 (2019: surplus of €277,000) and an income and expenditure reserve deficit of €606,000 (2019: deficit of €965,000). Growth in student recruitment year on year projected by the College, is expected to support the College in addressing its reserves deficit in full by the year 2025.

The College has been engaged in ongoing discussions with the Higher Education Authority regarding the financial position of the College. The College has taken on a non-pay cost cutting programme, and additional necessary steps such as a comprehensive budget setting programme, with monthly performance review by senior management to ensure that it operates with an income and expenditure reserves surplus in future periods.

The College continues to work under the health and safety restrictions in place due to Covid-19 and the College community of Staff and Students have all responded well to these restrictions staying within compliance of the measures and responding responsibly when exposure may have occurred.

HEA financial support for the necessary investments in IT equipment, additional staffing and health and safety measure which have arisen as a direct result of Covid-19 has been very much appreciated and it has ensured that the College continues to operate at a highly effective level.

On this basis, taking account of the impact of Covid-19 restrictions on the College, and combined with the cash reserves held by the College, the Members of An Bord consider it appropriate to have prepared these financial statements on a Going Concern basis.

(d) (i) Land and Buildings

Land and buildings are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation, adjusted for any provision of impairment.

A valuation of College land and buildings was carried out by McNally Handy and Partners, Chartered Surveyors at an effective date of 1 October 2014, being the transition date for reporting under FRS 102. The College has elected to use this valuation as the deemed cost of College Land and Buildings as at the transition date.

(d) (ii) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation, adjusted for any provision for impairment. Depreciation is provided on all property, plant and equipment, other than freehold land, at rates estimated to write off the cost less the estimated residual value of each asset on a straight line basis over their estimates useful lives, as follows:

Residual value represents the estimated amount which would currently be obtained from the disposal of an asset after deducting estimated costs on disposal, if the asset were already of an age and in the condition expected at the end of its useful life.

If there is objective evidence of impairment of the value of an asset, an impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Income and Expenditure.

(e) Heritage Assets

The College holds and maintains heritage assets such as books, paintings and artwork. Heritage assets acquired pre 1 October 2015 are not capitalised in the financial statements because it is considered that no reasonable value can be attributed to them owing to the lack of information on the original purchase cost. All costs incurred in relation to preservation and conservation are expensed as incurred.

In relation to Heritage asset additions acquired subsequent to 1 October 2015, the College capitalises these at either their cost (in the case of acquisitions made by the College) or their fair value (in the case of donations). Fair value is the amount obtainable from the sale of an asset in an arm's length transaction

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

between knowledgeable, willing parties, less the costs of disposal. While valuations are completed by appropriate experts, given the characteristics of the assets and the diverse nature of the collection in what is invariably a limited transaction market, there is a high level of judgement involved in assigning fair values to the collection.

Donated heritage assets are capitalised with reference to their insurance value, as this approximates their fair value. Heritage assets valued at less than €5,000 are not capitalised in the financial statements.

(f) Receivables

Receivables are recognised at fair value.

(g) Taxation

As an exempt charity, the College is not liable for corporation tax or income tax on any of its charitable activities. It is registered for value added tax. However, since the supply of education is an exempt activity on which no output tax is charged it is unable to recover input tax on the majority of its purchases. Certain research and commercial activities within the College are liable for VAT. Any input or output tax relating to these activities is returned to the Revenue by the College.

(h) Recognition of Income

State grants

State Grants for recurrent expenditure are allocated by the HEA on a calendar year basis. The grant reported in the Statement of Income and Expenditure is the amount determined to be appropriate to the relevant academic year, based on a 75%/25% split of the calendar year grant.

Other state grants are recognised on an accruals basis in line with the level of activity in the year.

Academic Fee Income

Academic Fee Income (including for Continuing Education in Art & Design), is recognised in the academic year to which it relates.

State research grants

Income from research grants and other contracts from the state is matched to expenditure and is included in the income of the year in which the related expenditure has been incurred.

Non-State research grants

Income from grants from non-state sources is recognised in the Statement of Income and Expenditure when performance related terms are met. If a restriction in use is specified but no performance related condition exists, the income is recorded in the Statement of Income and Expenditure when the College becomes entitled to the income.

Grants with unfulfilled performance related conditions are held as deferred income until such time as the conditions are met, at which point the income is recorded in the Statement of Income and Expenditure.

Grants with restrictions are recorded within the Statement of Income and Expenditure on entitlement to the income and subsequently retained within a restricted reserve until such time that the expenditure is incurred in line with the restriction.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

Donations and Endowments

Non exchange transactions without performance related conditions are donations and endowments. Donations and endowments with donor imposed restrictions are recognised in income when the College is entitled to the income. Income is retained within the restricted reserve until such time that it is utilised in line with such restrictions at which point the income is released to general reserves through a reserve transfer. Donations with no restrictions are recognised in income when the College is entitled to the funds.

Interest Income

All income from short term deposits is credited to the income and expenditure account in the period in which it is earned.

(i) Employee benefits

Short term benefits

Short term benefits such as holiday pay are recognised as an expense in the year, and the benefits that are accrued at the year-end are included in the payables figure in the Statement of Financial Position. There is no accrual for holiday pay in the year for academic staff due to the nature of their contracts.

Retirement benefits

The National College of Art and Design operates a defined benefit pension scheme, which is funded annually on a pay as you go basis from monies available to it including monies provided by the Higher Education Authority and from pension contributions deducted from staff salaries.

Pension costs reflect pension benefits earned by employees in the period and are shown net of staff contributions which are retained by the College. An amount corresponding to the pension charge is recognised as income to the extent that it is recoverable and offset by grants received in the year to discharge pension payments.

Actuarial gains or losses arising on scheme liabilities are reflected in the Statement of Comprehensive Income and a corresponding adjustment is recognised in the amount recoverable from the Higher Education Authority.

Pension Liabilities represent the present value of future payments earned by staff to date. Deferred pension funding represents the corresponding asset to be recoverable in future periods from the Higher Education Authority.

The National College of Art and Design also operates the Single Public Service Pension Scheme (Single Scheme) which is the defined benefit pension scheme for pensionable public servants appointed on or after 1 January 2013. Single Scheme member's contributions are paid over to the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform.

(j) Operating Leases

Rental expenditure under operating leases is recognised in the Statement of Income and Expenditure over the life of the lease. Expenditure is recognised on a straight-line basis over the lease period, except where there are rental increases linked to the expected rate of inflation, in which case these increases are recognised when incurred. Any lease incentives received are recognised over the life of the lease.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

(k) Foreign Currency

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate of exchange at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the financial year end are reported at the rates of exchange prevailing at that date.

(I) Capital Account

The capital account represents the unamortised value of State funding allocated for property, plant, equipment and heritage assets purchased after the 1 October 2015.

(m) Agency arrangements

The College acts as an agent in the collection and payment of support funds. Related payments received from HEA and subsequent disbursements to students are included in the Statement of Income and Expenditure and are also shown separately in Note 21.

2 CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the reporting date and the amounts reported for income and expenditure during the year. However the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. The following judgements have had the most significant effect on amounts recognised in the financial statements.

Depreciation and Residual Values

The Directors have reviewed the asset lives and associated residual values of all fixed asset classes, and have concluded that asset lives and residual values are appropriate.

Retirement Benefit Obligation

The assumptions underlying the actuarial valuations for which the amounts recognised in the financial statements are determined (including discount rates, rates of increase in future compensation levels, mortality rates and inflation trend rates) are updated annually based on current economic conditions, and for any relevant changes to the terms and conditions of the pension and post-retirement plans.

The assumptions can be affected by:

- (i) the discount rate, changes in the rate of return on high-quality corporate bonds;
- (ii) future compensation levels, future labour market conditions; and
- (iii) inflation, the difference in yields on fixed-interest and index-linked bonds as at the accounting date
- (iv) demographic, life expectancy post- retirement.

15 RETIREMENT BENEFITS

A Staff Superannuation Scheme and a Spouses' and Children's Pension Scheme set up under Section 20 of the National College of Art and Design Act, 1971 were approved in January 1984 and September 1987 respectively. The College's pension schemes are unfunded schemes. Staff contribute at a rate of 5% to the Staff Superannuation Scheme and 1.5% to the Spouses' and Children's Pension Scheme. The scheme provides a pension (eightieths per year of service), a lump sum (three eightieths per year of service) and spouses' and children's pensions. Normal retirement age is a members 65th birthday and pre-2004 members have an entitlement to retire without actuarial reduction from age 60. Pensions in payment (and deferment) normally increase in line with general public sector pay increases.

The Single Public Service Pension Scheme (Single Scheme) is the defined benefit pension scheme for pensionable public servants appointed on or after 1 January 2013 in accordance with the Public Service Pension (Single Scheme and Other Provisions) Act 2012. The scheme provides for a pension and retirement lump sum based on career-average pensionable remuneration, and spouse's and children's pensions. The minimum pension age is 66 years (rising in line with State pension age changes). It includes an actuarially-reduced early retirement facility from age 55. Pensions in payment increase in line with the consumer price index.

Single Scheme members are included in the pension liability at 30 September 2020, the actuarial calculations took into account the differing entitlements that apply to that scheme. €2.5m of the €91.8m liability at 30 September relates to the Single Scheme
