What career path did you want to follow as a child?

I loved drawing and creating from a very young age. It was my favourite subject in school. However, it wasn't until I got to secondary school, with encouragement from my art teachers, that I started to consider it as a career.

Why did you decide to study at National College of Art & Design?

I began my portfolio in Transition Year with the hope of getting into NCAD. The college's reputation and the range of exciting projects and disciplines offered in first year made it so appealing. I worked really hard and strived to get in and I am so grateful that I did.

How did you develop your career towards your current practice?

After graduating in 2012 with a degree in Art and Design History and Glass, I carried out internships in glass studios in Waterford, Amsterdam and London. I returned to NCAD in 2013 to study for my PDE and have worked as an art educator, as well as being an artist, ever since. In 2016 I set up a glass studio in Dublin with fellow artist Róisín de Buitléar. Glint Glass Studio is an open access studio with its own product line and educational programme.

What is the one experience during your time at NCAD that has informed you most in your work to date?

I can't say one experience in particular informed my work to date. It was my time studying under Dr. Caroline Madden that has had a lasting impact on my practice. The glass department offers an engaging programme. There was a strong focus on glass making skills and I had the opportunity to learn from many exciting guest lecturers, however Dr. Madden always encouraged me to develop my ideas and concepts and design beyond my skill set.

If you were chatting with current NCAD students today what is the one piece of advice you would offer?

Don't hold back. Immerse yourself in all your projects. Experimenting with a new technique or following an obscure research path could inspire a whole body of work.

Given the global turmoil and change accelerated by the COVID-19 pandemic, what in your opinion are the opportunities for those in creative industries?

As artists and designers, we're adaptable and equipped with the skills to evolve and problem solve, necessary and advantageous at uncertain times like these.

What career path did you want to follow as a child?

I wanted to be an artist from a young age but I didn't think it would be possible, as I wasn't particularly skilled at painting, drawing and other traditional means of art. However, my mam is a very talented dressmaker and I grew up with a strong appreciation for being able to make and create something from scratch. It wasn't until I had a fantastic teacher in secondary school who showed me how I could apply this love of handcrafts to a creative career, that I realised it was a possibility for me.

Why did you decide to study at National College of Art & Design?

NCAD has always had a fantastic reputation and it was a dream of mine to study there.

How did you develop your career towards your current practice?

After graduating I worked for myself for several years, completing commissions and selling products through some amazing Irish retailers (Om Diva Boutique, Atrium). I relocated to London in 2018 after realising that I wanted to learn from other designers and business people and to gain some experience working as part of a larger team. Here, I have learned to apply the skills that I have developed in textile design - such as high attention to detail and the ability to work with my hands - to other industries. I am currently Head of Production for the London-based jewellery brand Lily & Roo, and I continue working with textiles whenever I can.

What is the one experience during your time at NCAD that has informed you most in your work to date?

The fashion show that TAA put on in our final year was a huge learning curve for me. At that time, it was the largest body of work I had completed and, for the first time, I had to take into consideration things like pricing, creating a lookbook and following a critical path. It was a brilliant experience.

students today what is the one piece of advice you would offer?

Take advantage of your time at college to experiment with as many different techniques and materials as possible. Go to all your meetings with your tutors, as you will miss having that guidance when you graduate! Enjoy having time to create for the sake of creating.

As part of our NCAD In Public programme we are delighted to present in the NCAD Gallery the **ELECTRONIC SHEEP** duo of Brenda Aherne and Helen Delany with their exhibition, **Electro-Fuse** - 3 November 2021 – 14 January 2022. The internationally renowned designers have worked together since 1998 creating illustrative and typographic knitwear/jacquards based on narrative storylines drawing on their personal lives and socio-political histories.

Electro-Fuse captures an edit of knitwear from this prolific practice to include the first showing of newly commissioned *The Kilburn Tapestries*, and the premiere of their Electro-Fuse 2021 Collection. The exhibition also includes iconic retrospective pieces and ephemera from the ELECTRIC SHEEP archive. As part of this project the NCAD Gallery is bringing this work to Centre Culturel Irlandais, Paris in 2022, curated by Anne Kelly, NCAD.
