1. Introduction

This module is designed to support the development of ambitious and sophisticated writing practices by research students (and other learners who elect to take this course through the Creative Futures Academy). It will have a strong focus on writing in the context of art and design research.

In this module, writing is understood as not – or not only – the production of the thesis which forms a standard part of any research degree. Instead, it is approached as a wider ecology of practices and skills that include publishing and editing. As such the module combines workshops on these professional skills and perspectives. It will also act as a critical lens on the writing practice of the participants, as they share and review each other's work (proposals, writing experiments, etc.)

Guest tutors with expert professional backgrounds will be invited to lead workshops. Attention will be focused on current issues in research publishing such as the opportunities and challenges of open source publication, the use of Generative AI.

2. What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students will have:

- Acquired UNDERSTANDING students will acquire a critical understanding of the operations of publishers and editors in the field of academic publishing.
- Engaged in CRITICAL REFLECTION and FEEDBACK and developed EDITING SKILLS by engaging in peer-learning and workshop activities, participants will analyse each other's writing. They will have developed key editing skills.

 Developed a small PORTFOLIO of texts – students will have produced sophisticated publishing proposals that meet the expectations and criteria that operate in publishing today.

3. How will I learn?

The module will be taught in six 3-hour workshops. Participants will write, share and review texts that they and others produce over the course of the module. Students taking the module will form a community of learners.

Indicative workshop content

- Academic Publishing Today workshop with commissioning editors, reflecting on the peer review process, on open source publishing, etc. This session will include a proposal workshop – participants will be introduced to the proposal process employed by university presses and other academic publishers and review sample proposals.
- Editing Workshop a practical workshop in which participants learn and apply editing techniques used in different sectors of publishing including arts journalism and academic publishing.
- Rhetoric and other forms of persuasive writing.
- Writing as Research a critical examination of 'experimental' approaches to research and writing which have been developed in art and design and adjacent fields such as ethnography (autofictions, site writing, etc).
- Crit the final workshop in which participants review each other's texts.
