1. Introduction

The aims of this module are to:

- Situate the students' knowledge of contemporary art practice in a professional industry context and a diverse range of encounters.
- Further develop a context and relevant critical models of practice and curation for students' individual practices and research interests.
- Nurture professional networks, dialogue and exchange within the students' immediate peer group and the wider art infrastructure of organisations, institutions, formal and informal spaces of encounter.
- Enhance students' ability to engage with and critically respond to the thematics and concerns that drive advanced contemporary art practice.

2. What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students will be able to:

- 1. ARTICULATE some of the key concerns at play in the economy and cultures of contemporary art exhibitions, events and other public sites.
- 2. DEMONSTRATE an ability to engage critically with a contemporary art event/exhibition both individually and within a group audience.

- 3. UNDERSTAND the critical contexts at play in both their own practices and the wider international field of contemporary art.
- 4. EVIDENCE how art is mediated both discursively and speculatively within the space of exhibition or other public site of art practice.

Module content

This module consists of a field trip or study visit to a designated contemporary exhibition project, event or site of contemporary practice. It is designed to build on the peer support and critical momentum developed in Trimester 1 by engaging with a current site of contemporary practice as project/situation/exhibition or other public event. Students strengthen their knowledge of a framework for contemporary practice across selected areas. Through peer driven presentations and discussion, with the support of staff, students build a mutually beneficial space of discursive enquiry and exchange of ideas. An emphasis is placed on interrogating critical issues in relation to praxis and bringing historical and cultural awareness to the understanding of contemporary practice.

3. How will I learn?

The module requires active participation in engaging with the object of study both experientially and discursively. The field trip/study visit will involve engaging with the multi-dimensional nature of events/exhibitions which unroll spatially and temporally across diverse sites. Students will be facilitated to reflect on and critically respond to the event/exhibition in situ and through available channels of mediation particular to the event/exhibition.

4. What learning supports are provided?

Relevant reading and reference materials spanning a range of online and physical resources.

Visual and verbal material in the form of interviews, discussions and other modes of dissemination are provided.

Critical and contemporary relationships to presentation of material are modelled and practiced in class.

The project brief, as set by the module co-ordinator, will require students to evidence their understanding and critical response to the artistic and curatorial tactics and strategies at work within the site of contemporary practice addressed by the study visit. This response may be delivered as a verbal presentation with appropriate documentation or other means of discursively responding to the project brief; e.g. a round table discussion, public seminar or performative response.

10. How will I have the chance to evaluate the module?
