1. Introduction

This 5-credit workshop module forms part of a Critical Practice ‘Intensive’ offered to postgraduate students registered at NCAD and mid-career professionals who wish to develop their understanding and engagement with contemporary issues in art and design. It involves a full week of onsite learning with prior preparation and subsequent documentation.

A Critical Practice ‘Intensive’ is offered in late August / early September each year in conjunction with a partner institution. Such organisations will include art and design museums such as the Irish Museum of Modern Art.

The teaching team is formed of NCAD tutors, professionals from the partner organisation, and a guest tutor who is a high-profile practitioner in the field. The student group will form a learning community with diverse expertise and skills across art and design.

The Critical Practice ‘Intensive’ Workshop module will be organised over a series of days as a series of practical tasks and experiments relating to a changing specialist theme (see below) and designed to encourage collaboration, stimulate critical thinking and foster intellectual exchange.

The outcomes of this workshop will take the form of speculative texts, artworks and designs. Emphasis will be placed on intellectual creativity and critical thinking rather than on the practical ‘solutions’ or full resolution of the critical issues being examined.

The institutional context will encourage attention to public engagement and, if appropriate, the Critical Practice ‘Intensive’ may result in a public event and/or display.

2. What will I learn?

On successfully completing this module, participants will have:

1. Tested and extended high level creative and critical thinking skills by realising complex ideas in the form of art and design works;
2. Worked closely with others including professionals and postgraduate students from other fields thereby extending and deepening understanding of different disciplinary fields and competencies and well as different methods of collaboration;
3. Achieved a high-level understanding of the public engagement policies, priorities and practices of the institutional partner.

Module content

Each year, the Critical Practice 'Intensive' (formed of this 'Workshop' module and co-requisite 'Seminar' module) will be dedicated to a specialist theme concerned with aspects of public knowledge and social engagement in relation to topical matters of concern. Themes will be announced each Spring and will change on an annual basis. Typical themes might include 'Self-determination', 'Dark heritage' Culture of/after Conflict', 'Ecological Prototyping', 'Democratising AI', etc.

The themes will be proposed by the teaching team on the basis of their topicality, and be subject to the approval of the NCAD's Academic Council and the agreement of the partner institution.

Typically, the theme will have a strong relationship to the research interests and public engagement programme of the partner institution/s.

3. How will I learn?

This module will be taught in the form workshops (brief, short-term practical assignments, etc.) on site at either NCAD or at the partner institution.

4. What learning supports are provided?

The module will be supported by a VLE before the onsite learning takes place to allow students to prepare and share material in advance and access key content (readings, films, plans, etc.). During the workshop students will have access to NCAD technical facilities and the library as required. At the end of the onsite intensive phase of the module, students will be required to document their work on a dedicated website or an established platform like Wakelet. Instruction will be provided.

5. Am I eligible to take this module?

This module is available to postgraduate students registered at NCAD and to qualified applicants who are not currently registered at the College. The latter may be graduates with art and design qualifications who are looking to undertake postgraduate study or mid-career professionals who wish to develop their understanding and engagement with contemporary issues in art and design.

Students who are not currently registered with NCAD will be required to make an application which demonstrates evidence of a current practice art and design and a statement outlining their reasons for wishing to undertake this *Critical Practice 'Intensive'*. Typically, they will have completed a BA degree in a field related to the theme of the *Critical Practice 'Intensive'*. The selection of suitably qualified candidates will be made by the academic staff teaching on the *Critical Practice 'Intensive'*.

7. Feedback, results and grading

Postgraduate students who are registered at NCAD will elect to undertake this module as an option and as such it will contribute to their overall profile of grades in any given trimester.

8. What happens if I fail?

For students registered to PG programmes at NCAD who do not complete this module successfully, resit opportunities will be provided in the next trimester.

9. When and where is this module offered?

Learning will take place at NCAD and/or on the site of the partner institution.

10. How will I have the chance to evaluate the module?

It is important to NCAD that students inform the development of teaching and learning at NCAD. We encourage all students to communicate their concerns and their observations about their study to members of staff so that any changes can be made in a timely manner.

About two-thirds of the way through the year, a student forum will be convened to gather students' comments about their study and the delivery of the programme. In addition, at the end of Trimester 2, students have the opportunity to complete an online evaluation of their study and experience at NCAD. These evaluation events are important to current and future students, to ensure we can enhance the delivery of programmes at NCAD.

In addition, you are invited to discuss your experience on the module with your lecturers at any point during the year. You can also relay your comments to the class student representative who will communicate your comments to the staff.
