1. Introduction

Produced in relation to the final exhibition project, this module is both an articulation and reflection of that exhibition/mode of dissemination. Whilst not intended as a substitute for the exhibition, the form that this module takes must connect and extend for a public, the concerns within the individual work. Iterated either as an 'artist's talk' and/or 'artist's statement', this module must demonstrate the student's ability to objectively reflect on their work and its potential for further development. During the module students learn to position their work in relation to audiences and to find creative and inclusive ways of introducing their work to audiences both specialist and general.

The aims of this module are to:

- Encourage the student's in communicating the concerns within their work.
- Develop the ability to critically reflect on the successes and failures of one's own work.
- Situate the student's own practice in a number of professional arenas.
- Connect student's own ambition for their work with that of other exhibiting artists.
- Critically interpret their discovery and the relationship between the form and subject of the work.

2. What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students will be able to:

- 1. CONNECT with a range of audiences through appropriate channels.
- 2. ARTICULATE the ideas at play and the ambitions of the work into spoken or written form with a contemporary awareness of the potentials and conventions of the form.
- 3. DEVELOP the ability to mediate the work and/or practice in a variety of contexts.

Module content

Students learn to develop and articulate their own positions within the contemporary discipline, through participation in seminars and by finding the relevant forms and methods to successfully mediate the key ideas in their practices to audiences.

Discursive seminars, written and verbal presentations, case study examples of professional practice and mediation of art practices and art works.

9. When and where is this module offered?

The module is delivered in School of Fine Art Seminar Rooms during Trimester 2 (January-April).

10. How will I have the chance to evaluate the module?

It is important to NCAD that students inform the development of teaching and learning at NCAD. We encourage all students to communicate their concerns and their observations about their study to members of staff so that any changes can be made in a timely manner.

About two-thirds of the way through the year, a student forum will be convened to gather students' comments about their study and the delivery of the programme.
