## 1. Introduction

This module comprises a range of topics each focused on a specific research area/ question. Each question addresses a variety of cultural and social contexts for art practice today. They also, frequently, concern the crossover between art and related disciplines. Key features of Situations include:

- seminars on specific research interests of contributors;
- invited/ guest contributions;
- collaborative initiatives with other institutions.

The aims of this module are to:

1. Introduce research material, questions and practices related to the specific seminar topic.
2. Analyse the specific research topic and consider it in relation to the broader contexts of the discourse and practice of contemporary art and the student's own practice and research concerns.
3. Consider the relevant modes of communication that best articulate the research topic's significance to the students' own and others' practices to the relevant audiences.

## 2. What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students will be able to:

1. RESEARCH: research material, questions and practices related to the specific module material.

2. ANALYSE: the seminar material and relate it to the broader contexts of (i) contemporary art and (ii) the student's own practice and research concerns.
3. COMMUNICATE: Communicate the relevance of the specific research questions to their own and others' practices.

### Module content

Specific module content changes according to the research focus and concerns of the seminar leader. In the past seminars have included topics such as Systems Aesthetics; Art & Literature; Art and Ecology; and collaborations with Irish Film Institute; Irish Museum of Modern Art; The Joinery (a not for profit gallery.)

### 3. How will I learn?

Learning occurs through a variety of methods including lectures, class discussion, research activities, group work, workshops and projects.
