Introduction

This module focuses on key modern and contemporary theoretical paradigms concerned with the public sphere and the definition and constitution of publics. Students will consider the role that aesthetic practices can play in the production of social relations and public spaces. Key case studies will be considered and critiqued. Indicative content includes definitions and practices of: The Public Sphere; Relational and Evental Aesthetics; The Event, and key writers such as Habermas, Badiou and Mouffe.

What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students should be able to:

1. **RESEARCH:** the key theoretical paradigms that inform current debates about the public sphere;
2. **ANALYZE:** the relationships between their own thought and practice and the various publics it might engage.
3. **COMMUNICATE:** a good knowledge of the practices, vocabularies, theories and figures that influence contemporary understandings of publics and the public sphere.
