#### Introduction

This module offers an opportunity for Design History and Material Culture MA students to engage with design practice by critically assessing contemporary interests in innovation on the part of design researchers and consultancies. It will consider the role/s of R&D, new materials and technology, prototyping as well current ideas like Design Thinking, Disruptive Design, UX Design and Speculative Design in the shaping of the material and digital world. Led by DHMC, the module will take the form of workshops with design professionals. As such, students will be encouraged to play an active role in the workshops by presenting short papers, interviewing and introducing guest participants. As such, the module aspires to develop professional public programming / presentation skills in the student group.

#### What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students will be able to:

- UNDERSTAND current specialist techniques and concepts in design research;
- CRITICALLY ASSESS contemporary design thinking and practices in relation to innovation;
- COMMUNICATION techniques relating to interviews and structured conversations.

#### How will I learn?

The module will take the form of 2 x day workshops / seminars featuring contributions from contemporary designers. Students will research the activities and interests of the participants and play an active role in shaping the discussion. In this way, students will acquire interview skills.
