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Welcome / History of the College

The National College of Art and Design is unique in its position within art and design education in Ireland. It has long been the central and most important art and design educational institution in Ireland and today we offer the largest range of art and design undergraduate and postgraduate degrees in the state. No matter where you are, you will probably find that a graduate of NCAD has contributed to the visual culture that surrounds you.

The College has had many guises since its origins in 1746, when Robert West had a private drawing school in George's Lane in Dublin. In its present structure, NCAD was established in 1971 by Act of An tOireachtas and is now governed by a board (An Bord) appointed by the Minister for Education and Skills. Students have two places on that board.

The College has been located in Thomas Street since 1980 with all Schools and Departments becoming located on one campus in 1998. The campus includes the James Street Campus at 101-103 James Street. In 2008, NCAD completed a refurbishment of what was the old fire station on Thomas Street. Now named Harry Clarke House, this building houses the School of Visual Culture, lecture theatres and the NCAD Gallery.

While we continue to feel the impact of the COVID pandemic in College life and beyond, we are delighted by all that is possible this year. All of our programmes involve on-campus delivery. The Students' Union has continued to provide great support to all of our students, including some very welcome on-campus social activities. The College community has worked hard to keep us all safe and keep the campus open by committing to a high level of observance of COVID safety measures.



These are strange times and the sense of loss can be challenging. It can be difficult to avoid a focus on what is not possible. And yet we continue to be amazed by everything that IS possible; by the resilience, creativity and kindness shown by you, our students. We were deeply impressed by all that was achieved by NCAD's students last year, and we are looking forward to the realisation of your work this year.

As we renew our work on delivering the Bold and Curious learning environment described in our Strategic Plan, we hope that you will continue to see changes happening across the College: improvements in the fabric of the campus, in our IT infrastructure and in the learning and teaching environment. As a student at NCAD, your voice is important in all of these developments and can be channelled through membership of School/Department Boards, at Academic Council and through the Students' Union representatives at An Bord.



Who we are – structure of the College

NCAD has four schools: Design, Education, Fine Art and Visual Cultures.

NCAD is the lead partner in <u>Creative Futures Academy</u>, a ground-breaking partnership between NCAD, University College Dublin and the Institute of Art, Design and Technology to create new learning experiences and more flexible access to creative courses.

Academic and Student Affairs is home to Student Services and to the administration and development of NCAD's undergraduate and postgraduate programmes.

The College is governed by An Bord, appointed by the Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science. It is managed by the College Management Team.

Student Services

Welcome to the NCAD Academic and Student Affairs team. The team encompasses Student Services and Admissions, Academic Affairs and Student Support. We are here to support you to succeed in your studies at NCAD.

Student Services & Admissions (SS&A) is the central registry for the College and looks after many aspects of your student journey, including: pre-entry support, admissions, registrations, fees and grants, examinations, Studio+, Erasmus, student records, transcripts and conferrings.

You can find us at the Student Information Desk, which is located just off the Student Concourse. The Student Information Desk is your first port of call for any questions relating to your studies at NCAD. The team can help you with questions you might have about your registration or fees; issue letters confirming registration; sign and stamp forms for Social Welfare; give help with the student assistance fund; reissue student cards; book doctors' appointments and help with a range of other issues you might encounter during your time at NCAD.

The Student Information Desk is open between 10am-1pm and 2pm-4pm Monday to Friday during term time, or you can email information@ncad.ie

Registration

All full-time and part-time students must register annually. Registration is made online. Students may pay their fees online by logging into My NCAD with their student number and password.

Student Cards

You will receive a student card when you register. You will need this to use the Library and photocopiers on campus.

If you lose your card, you can ask for a replacement at the Student Information Desk. It will cost €15 to issue a new card, so look after it carefully.

Time Out and Withdrawals

Students can ask for Time Out if they wish to take time away from their programme of study. You can apply for a Time Out for a period of one or two semesters.

If you wish to take time out in Semester 1 you must apply for it by 31st October. You must apply by 15th January if you wish to take time out in Semester 2. Requests for Time Out are approved by the Head of Academic Affairs, in consultation with your Head of School or Department.

To apply for Time Out, you will need to fill in an application form and email it to **studentrecords@ncad.ie**

If you are thinking about leaving your programme for any reason, it is important not to just drop out. You should withdraw formally, which will ensure that you will keep some of your entitlement to free fees in the future.

Before withdrawing, you should talk to your Head of Department as they will be able to offer advice. If you are sure that you want to withdraw, the Fees & Grants Office can advise you on the regulations covering the Free Fees and grants schemes, and on any other implications of your leaving your Programme feesandgrants@ncad.ie.

Grants

Students from England, Scotland or Wales may qualify for a higher education grant. You can find out if you are eligible at **www.susi.ie**

Students from outside Ireland or the UK should obtain information on scholarships or grants from the Ministry of Education (or other appropriate state agency) in their country of residence. Students who have not established residence in Ireland are not eligible for maintenance grants from Irish grant authorities.

NCAD's full-time programmes are included on the register of approved programmes for non-EU/EEA/Swiss students' access to employment.

Field Trips

If you receive a grant and you participate in obligatory field trips as part of your programme of study, you should check your entitlement to claim your costs under the Higher Education Grant Scheme at www.studentfinance.ie. It will be your responsibility to submit your claim to the grant authority, and you must retain all travel and accommodation receipts and boarding cards in order for your expenses to be refunded.

If you receive a SUSI grant, you must apply for your refund BEFORE the field trip. SUSI will assess your application and confirm if you will be eligible for a refund. It will be your responsibility to complete and submit forms to SUSI, and you must retain all travel and accommodation receipts and boarding cards in order for your expenses to be refunded. Student Support

Student Health

NCAD provides a medical and nursing service which is open to all registered students. This service is in addition to your own family GP or specialist healthcare provider.

Appointments with the Doctor are usually offered by phone, but in-person appointments are available on request.

Appointments with the Nurse are available in person. Inperson appointments take place at Thomas Court Medical Centre.

Medical services are available three days a week at the following times:

Tuesdays 2:00pm – 4:30pm Doctor (female)
Wednesdays 9:00am – 11:30am Advanced nurse
Fridays 9:30am to 12:00pm Doctor (male)

The GP Service and Advanced nurse can provide emergency care and give confidential professional advice. Student health records do not form part of their academic records.

How do I make an appointment?

You can make an appointment with the GP or the Advanced Nurse by visiting the Student Information Desk or by calling 01 636 4200.

There is a €10.00 charge to see the Doctor and this charge must be paid before your appointment can be confirmed. Students who receive an Access Grant are exempt from the charge and the fee is waived if the appointment is a repeat consultation for the same condition within two weeks.

If you need to collect a prescription, the Thomas Street Pharmacy offers a 10% discount on NCAD prescriptions to all students of the College. The pharmacy is across the road from the main entrance to the College.

Student Counselling

The Student Counselling Service is free and confidential for all NCAD students. The service offers support, counselling and psychotherapy for students who are experiencing difficulties.

Linda Mackin heads up the counselling team. In-person appointments are available Monday – Thursday during term time from 10:30am – 4:00pm. The Student Counselling service is based on the second floor in Harry Clarke House. Online sessions are also available.

The NCAD Access Office is here to ensure that all students are supported to reach their academic potential and to become independent learners. The Access Office is here to provide equal access to education for students with disabilities, mental health conditions and other barriers to participation in third-level education.

Service

At NCAD, we are committed to ensuring that all students are enabled to fully participate in the life of the College. The European Social Fund for Students with Disabilities finances much of the study support we provide for disabled students. The funding is not means-tested and it is available to undergraduate and postgraduate students who are registered on full-time programmes.

You can register with the Access Office for support and reasonable accommodations if you are a student with any of the following disabilities:

- Autism
- ADD/ADHD
- Blind/Visual Impairment
- Deaf/Hard of hearing
- DCD Dyspraxia/Dysgraphia
- Mental Health conditions
- Neurological conditions including brain injuries and speech and language disabilities
- Significant ongoing illnesses
- Physical disabilities
- Specific Learning difficulty, including Dyslexia and Dyscalculia



Assistive technology

The Assistive Technology Service provides training, support and IT facilities to students who are registered with the NCAD Access office. We can provide specialist software and support for students with specific learning difficulties or disabilities.

We have a range of specialist software available to help students with writing and research, for example:

- Mind-mapping programmes to help with planning essays and projects
- Text-to-speech programmes that read text aloud through a computer
- Software that converts printed text (e.g. a page in a library book) to editable digital text in Microsoft Word
- Speech recognition software to dictate notes or essays
- Proof-reading software





The Assistive Technology service can also help students to format their thesis.

We regularly hold Assistive Technology Seminars to demonstrate how to use free software into your essay writing and research. These are open to all students. The **NCAD Assistive Technology blog** has details of free software and apps that you can use in your studies.

Edward Murphy Library

Where we are

The Edward Murphy Library is the best art library in Ireland for modern and contemporary art. We have a collection of over 93,000 books and exhibition catalogues with emphasis on 19th-21st Century art and design.

What we do

As well as having an extensive catalogue of books and exhibition catalogues, the Library subscribes to around 300 magazines and journals. Students have access to a number of electronic resources and indexes to art and design journals and online journal articles.

As much of the collection is kept in store, it must be ordered in advance. You can check the **Library Catalogue** to see what we hold:

All new students are given a tour of the Library at the start of each year. If you need advice or guidance, the staff working at the Issue Desk are experts in studying and working in art and design and will be happy to help you.

Learning Centre

The Learning Centre is here to support students and staff in making the best use of the Library's resources and developing their research skills. If you are finding it difficult to use the Library catalogue or having trouble finding materials on the shelves, we can give you personal guided tours of the Library or one-to-one tuition in using the catalogue. We can also provide in-depth tutorials on how to find information and conduct research for students who are starting major projects or theses.

You can access the Library's art and design databases at the Learning Centre. You can also use the Learning Centre to view DVDs and access the internet.

The Learning Centre has a range of materials to help with language learning, which can help develop your existing skills or prepare you for time abroad.

The Visual Resources Centre

The Visual Resources Centre is located in the Library and it holds a collection of digital resources, DVDs and CDs. The Library subscribes to the ARTstor Digital Library, a collection of over one million images.

The VRC can consult on any issues relating to finding art and design images and we can provide one-to-one training sessions on how to use ARTstor and the NCAD Image Library. We can also provide training on presentation software on specialist citation software.

NIVAL

The National Irish Visual Arts Library (NIVAL) is a unique research library that contains a large collection of reference material documenting all aspects of 20th Century and contemporary Irish art and design. NIVAL is an initiative of NCAD in partnership with the Arts Council and it was established by former NCAD librarian Edward Murphy.

NIVAL's collection includes Irish visual art, including Irish art abroad and art from non-Irish artists working in Ireland. NIVAL holds books, journals, exhibition catalogues and items such as invitation cards, press releases and news clippings.

Staff at NIVAL can give you expert advice on how to use the collection for your specific research queries. We are located on the ground floor of the Clock Building, down the hall from the Sybil Connolly Theatre. You can call in to see us or phone 01 636 4347 or 01 646 1102.

By registering as a student at NCAD, you agree to observe the rules and regulations of the College.



Student Complaints

If you need to raise a concern about your experience at NCAD, you should follow the Student Complaints Procedure. This has been designed to support students and staff in situations where a student makes a complaint about their experience at NCAD. You can find the full Student Complaints Procedure here.

NCAD is always trying to improve the student experience and we take complaints seriously, aim to resolve issues as quickly as possible and, where it is possible, informally and locally. You should feel confident to raise a concern without risk of disadvantage.

Speak Out

Speak Out is an anonymous online reporting tool for students, staff and visitors to NCAD to disclose incidents of bullying, cyberbullying, harassment, discrimination, hate crimes, coercive behaviour or control, stalking, assault, sexual harassment, sexual assault and rape. If you need them, the tool will also help you find relevant supports and give information on formal reporting procedures.

Your Voice

Student forums

During the year, you will be asked to give feedback on your studies. This feedback is significant in improving your programme of study, enhancing student life at NCAD and contributing to the improvement of student wellbeing at the College. You will also be asked to give feedback in national surveys. These surveys, carried out across Ireland, contribute to improving the experience and wellbeing of all students in Ireland.

Each year, you will be invited to take part in a student forum. These sessions are your opportunity to tell us about your experience of studying on your programme. It is important for the College to hear about what is good and what could be improved.

Quality assurance and quality enhancement

Quality Assurance processes are the ways that the College checks, evaluates and makes judgements about the quality and standards of the work of the College, the student learning experience and the wider research and learning environment.


Quality Enhancement are the ways that the College responds to feedback from students, staff, accrediting bodies and the cultural and creative industries to improve the student learning experience and the wider research and learning environment.

As a student, your voice has an important part to play in Quality Assurance and Quality Enhancement by:

- Giving feedback on your learning experience to your student reps and your teachers
- Taking part in Programme Review Forums
- Completing the annual NCAD survey and the Irish Survey of Student Engagement
- Completing the National Graduate Survey after you graduate
- Taking part in QA reviews when you have the opportunity
- Becoming a Student Representative or joining a Student Council

The feedback you give is used in lots of ways. It informs discussions about programme enhancements and institutional enhancements. It is included in each Department or School's annual Enhancement Statement, which is published on the NCAD website.

Make a Difference

Access and Outreach

As a student at NCAD, you have the opportunity to get involved in some of our Access and Outreach programmes. We are passionate about creating meaningful opportunities for young learners, mature learners, disabled learners and learners who have support needs. NCAD has a wide preentry outreach programme, working with 30 local primary schools and after-school homework clubs and 32 Dublin secondary schools on a variety of projects.

Arts Mentoring Programme

This project aims to engage secondary school pupils in art and to build a relationship between the schools that participate and NCAD. You have the opportunity to work with secondary school pupils to help them develop a contemporary scheme of artwork, which gives the pupils insight into how to build a portfolio and on what life is like as an art and design student. At the end of the project, the pupils have the chance to stage an exhibition of their work at NCAD.

NCAD Access Day

NCAD Access Day is designed to help prospective students understand what NCAD can offer them in art and design higher education. Secondary school pupils and their art teachers are able to take part in workshops that are designed and delivered by NCAD students. NCAD works with schools that have a designated disadvantaged status and the College has developed strong links with our partner schools. Each NCAD Department offers workshops and pupils have had the opportunity to undertake workshops in areas such as Digital Portraiture, printmaking, ceramics and portfolio preparation.

Student Shadowing Programme

The Student Shadowing Programme invites teachers to nominate two pupils from their school to visit NCAD for two days-in-the-life of an NCAD student. The pupils have the chance to shadow an NCAD student in their studio practice and visual culture lectures, showing them what life is like as a busy art and design student.

NCAD Clancy Quay

The Clancy Quay Artist Studio is a collaborative project of NCAD and Kennedy Wilson Ireland. Each year, four graduating artists from the NCAD Access programme are selected to work full-time in the studio at Clancy Quay, with studio and utilities costs met by Kennedy Wilson Ireland. This programme supports emerging artists and creates a contemporary arts programme in the local community. The participating artists are able to engage with each other's art practices and the local community in Clancy Quay through formal and informal discussions, events and exhibitions.

Creative Arts Summer School (CASS)

The Creative Arts Summer School raises awareness of creative qualifications and the opportunities within creative industries through a summer school delivered across six colleges each June. CASS is linked with further education, community settings, DEIS schools and a range of cultural institutions. Workshops are led by arts tutors from the participating colleges and access student ambassadors

talk to participants about their own creative journeys.

1916 'Leaders and Learners' Bursary

The 1916 Bursary is a HEA-funded initiative to support students from target groups who are currently underrepresented in higher education, including lone parents. This fund provides students with a bursary of €5000 per academic year to support them in their studies. Full-time and part-time students are eligible to apply. Community Mentoring

The Community Mentoring Programme is an interinstitutional, community-based mentoring programme based across Dun Laoghaire Institute of Design and Technology, Marino Institute of Education, NCAD, Royal College of Surgeons, Trinity College Dublin and University College Dublin.

Community Mentors are a valuable community resource. They can help to share information and advice about their college experience and help prospective students to build awareness of college courses, how to apply and the benefits of a college education.

The Community Mentoring Programme aims to improve the levels of diversity in higher education and to increase equity of access for all communities in Dublin.

Dublin UNESCO Learning City

In 2019, Dublin became a member of the UNESCO Global Network of Learning Cities to promote Dublin as a learning region. Dublin Learning City involves collaboration with community, education and government partners to develop intergenerational learning communities.

Each year, Dublin Learning City hosts an annual Learning Festival to promote the learning activities that exist in Dublin. The festival takes place during March and April.




Studio +
/ Visual
Culture +
and Erasmus

Studio+/Visual Culture+ is an option open to all Fine Art, Design and Visual Culture students to take an extended four year degree that gives you the opportunity between your second and final year to engage with the world beyond NCAD by gaining practical work experience in the form of internships and industry placements on live commercial, social or community projects. Studio+/Visual Culture + can also include a work placement abroad or a study abroad period through the Erasmus programme with internationally recognised art and design faculties partnered with NCAD. Students who choose Studio+/Visual Culture+ will complete a 4 year BA in Design, Fine Art or Visual Culture or a 4 year BA (International).

You will be asked during your second year if you want to participate in Studio + /Visual Culture + or Erasmus and at the end of the year, you will select modules over the course of two semesters to make up 60 credits in total for the year.


